



Imperatives

An imperative sentence expresses a direct command, request, invitation, warning, or instruction. The subject of an imperative sentence is "you," but "you" is not usually explicitly said. When you is the subject of an imperative sentence, it is called *you understood*. This means that everyone understands that *you* is the subject, without having to explicitly include *you* in the sentence.

You included as the subject	You understood
You hand me that bear.	Hand me that bear.
You tell me about him.	Tell me about him.
