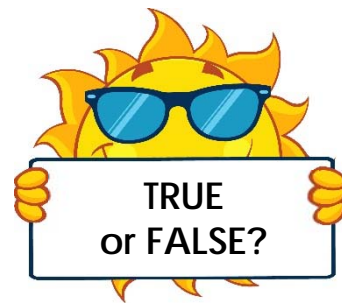


Relative Clauses

| 1. | A relative clause is a clause that uses a relative pronoun to describe a verb. | TRUE | FALSE |
