Types of Logical Fallacies



ad hominem	personal attack
strawman	attacks a position the opponent doesn't really hold
appeal to ignorance	a claim that truth/facts are unknown
false dichotomy	limiting options to two when they are actually many options
slippery slope	moving from a benign premise to an improbably extreme
circular argument	repeating what has already been assumed
hasty generalization	making a general statement without sufficient evidence to support it
red herring	using something that isn't really relevant to distract from the argument
tu quoque	meaning "you too" it is an appeal to hypocrisy
causal fallacy	any logical breakdown when identifying a cause
fallacy of sunk costs	believing we should continue with something because we already have so much invested in it
appeal to authority	the misuse of authority to steer away from other evidence
equivocation	using a word phrase or sentence deliberately to confuse-deceive-or mislead
appeal to pity	distracting from the argument by trying to get someone to feel sorry for you
bandwagon	arguing that something is right or good because everyone is doing it
