Magic and Mischief

While Harry Potter and the Sorcerer's Stone explores serious themes like good versus evil, danger, and loss, J.K. Rowling balances these darker moments with humor. From silly spells to amusing characters, her use of humor makes the story fun and engaging, helping readers enjoy the magical world while still understanding its challenges.

When Ron gets it wrong, Hermione corrects him by saying, "It's Levi-O-sa, not Levio-SA!" This small moment of frustration turns into one of the book's most memorable funny scenes.
