



Complex Sentences

A complex sentence contains a main (independent) clause and a subordinate (dependent) clause that provides additional, less important information. The dependent (subordinate) clause is connected to the main clause by a connecting word called a subordinating conjunction.

DIRECTIONS: Use subordinating conjunctions like *before*, *though*, *unless*, *when*, *now that*, or *since* to add **a dependent clause** to each independent clause provided..

1. The dog stopped biting at his wound.
2. The movie starts at eight.
3. All my chores are done.
4. I may mow the lawn again today.
5. Joe thought about going out.
6. It's been a pretty decent day.
