### **verbal irony**

Verbal irony is when the speaker intends that something other than the literal meaning of their words be understood.

### **dramatic irony**

Dramatic irony is a literary technique, first used in Greek tragedy, in which the audience knows more than the characters. This means that the full meaning of a character's words or actions is known to the audience, but not to the character themselves.

### **situational irony**

The reader/viewer expects one thing to happen and the opposite happens instead.
