Chiasmus: a literary device in which the grammar of one phrase is inverted in the phrase that follows, so two key concepts from the original phrase reappear in the second phrase in inverted order.

Antithesis: in a chiasmus, the order or relation of the ideas is inverted; in an antithesis, the ideas are replaced with their opposites.

Antimetabole: The most common type of chiasmus is called antimetabole. In an antimetabole, the same words (not just the same or similar) concepts appear in each part of the sentence.
