Toothpaste also includes flavors and colors to make brushing more fun. These parts of the mixture don't change how the toothpaste works, but they make it taste better and look more appealing.

Now let's look at shampoo. Shampoo is also a mixture. One important compound found in shampoo is called sodium lauryl sulfate. It helps create the foam and bubbles that lift dirt and oil from your hair. Another compound called citric acid helps keep the shampoo at the right pH level so it's safe for your scalp.

Other ingredients, like fragrances and conditioners, are added to improve the smell and softness of your hair. These don't react chemically with the other parts of the shampoo—they just mix in.

What's cool is how mixtures and compounds work together in harmony. The compounds do the real work—like cleaning, protecting, or softening—while the mixture keeps everything blended so it's easy to use.

Scientists test these products carefully to make sure they're safe and effective. Without a good understanding of mixtures and compounds, toothpaste might not protect your teeth, or shampoo could irritate your skin. Thanks to chemistry, we can enjoy clean teeth and shiny hair every day.
