## How Deer Communicate in the Wild

Deer have many ways of communicating with each other. They use sounds, body movements, scents, and visual displays to send messages to other deer. Communication helps deer stay safe, find mates, and care for their young.

One way deer communicate is through sound. They make different noises for different situations. For example, a mother deer, called a doe, uses soft grunts to call her fawn. Bucks, or male deer, may snort loudly to warn others of danger. During mating season, bucks also use deep grunts to challenge other males and attract females.

Visual displays are also part of deer communication. Bucks with large antlers often show them off to demonstrate strength. They may also fight with their antlers to establish dominance.
