The Dazzling Dragonfly

Dragonflies are insects, which means they have six legs, three body parts, and two pairs of wings. But unlike most insects, dragonflies are expert fliers. One of the coolest things about dragonflies is their eyes. Each dragonfly has two large compound eyes made up of thousands of tiny lenses. As adults, dragonflies only live for a few months, but during that time, they are busy flying, eating, and finding mates. They are also important to the environment, helping to control insect populations and serving as food for birds and frogs.
