Grasshoppers have two pairs of wings. The front wings are tough and act as shields to protect the delicate back wings. When they need to escape danger, they unfold their back wings to take short flights. Another unique feature is their antennae, which help them feel, smell, and navigate their environment.

Some grasshoppers have unique patterns or even horns. For example, certain species in hot, dry regions may have small spikes on their bodies to help them survive tough conditions. Every grasshopper species has its own special adaptations, making them one of the most diverse and interesting insect groups in the world.
