The story of The Little Red Hen reminds workers that success comes from effort. Just as the Hen enjoyed her bread because she did all the work, in real life, rewards often go to those who take responsibility and put in the effort.

The story applies to many situations because it teaches fairness, responsibility, and effort. Whether at home, in school, or at work, the lesson remains the same—hard work pays off, and those who contribute deserve the reward.
