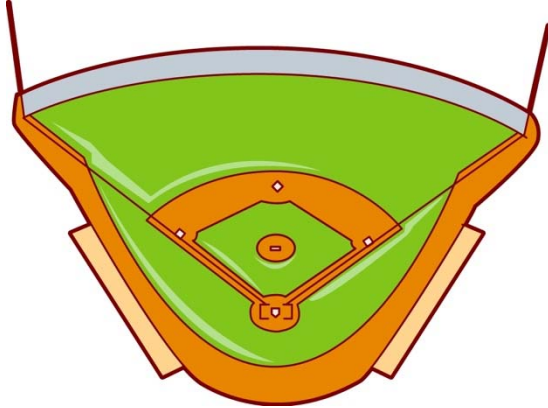

- **Outfielders:** These players stand in the outfield and are responsible for catching fly balls hit by the batter. They need to have a strong throwing arm to prevent runners from advancing.

Scoring and Gameplay
