Lionfish: What's for Dinner?

The lionfish is a true hunter of the ocean. As a carnivore, it eats only other animals, making it a fierce and efficient predator. Lionfish mainly feed on small fish, shrimp, and crabs. They are not picky eaters and will eat almost anything they can catch, as long as it fits into their mouths. This diet is one of the reasons why lionfish have become such a problem in areas where they are invasive.

Lionfish use their unique body features to hunt for food. They rely on their excellent eyesight to spot prey hiding in coral reefs or swimming nearby.
