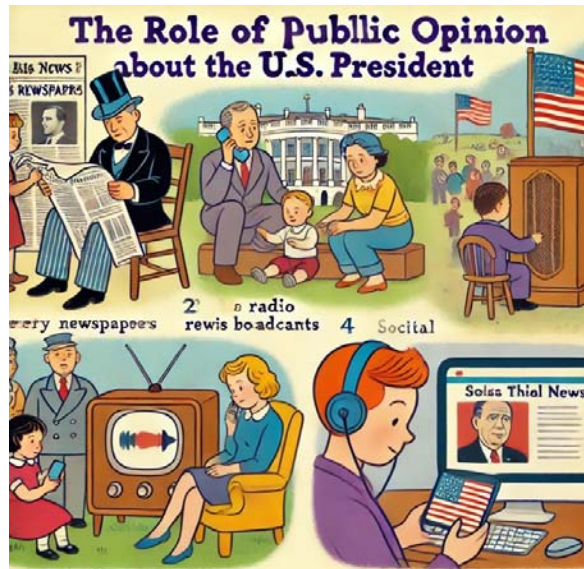

Media & Presidents
