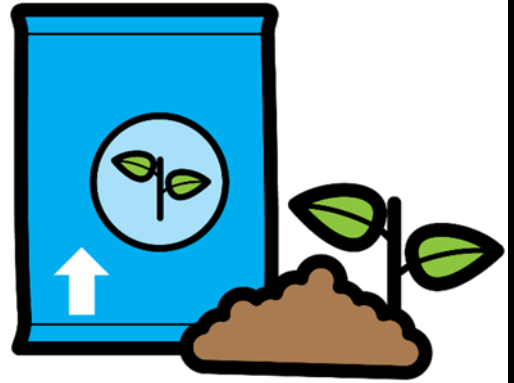

Perfect Planting
