Power of Community

In Charles Dickens' *A Christmas Carol*, the story shows how important community and connection are to living a happy and meaningful life. At the beginning of the story, Ebenezer Scrooge is a lonely man who avoids others. He has no close friends or family in his life because he chooses to value money over relationships. He even refuses his nephew Fred's invitation to Christmas dinner and scoffs at the idea of spending time with others.
