Revenge Unleashed

In *Wuthering Heights* by Emily Brontë, Heathcliff's thirst for revenge shapes both his character and the novel's dramatic events. Heathcliff's early life at *Wuthering Heights* is filled with hardship. As an orphan adopted by Mr. Earnshaw, he experiences love and care, but this changes when Mr. Earnshaw dies.
