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Daily Habits and Behaviors of Rhinoceroses

Rhinos also have strong bonds with their young. Mother rhinos are very protective and will stay with their calves for two to three years. During this time, the mother teaches her calf how to find food, avoid danger, and interact with other rhinos.

Although rhinos are generally peaceful, they can become aggressive if they feel threatened. Their horns and large size make them powerful defenders. Understanding rhinos' habits and behaviors helps conservationists protect these amazing animals and ensure they have safe spaces to thrive.
