## 7. Fouls and Free Kicks

Fouls occur when a player commits an illegal act, such as pushing, tripping, or using their hands to touch the ball (except for the goalkeeper within the penalty area). When a foul is committed, the opposing team is awarded a free kick from the spot of the foul.

## 8. Penalty Kicks

If a foul occurs inside the penalty area, the opposing team is awarded a penalty kick. This is a one-on-one situation between the kicker and the goalkeeper, with the ball placed 12 yards from the goal.

## 9. Yellow and Red Cards

Referees use yellow and red cards to enforce discipline. A yellow card is a warning, while a red card results in the player being sent off the field, leaving their team with one less player for the remainder of the match.

## 10. Throw-Ins, Corner Kicks, and Goal Kicks

Throw-ins are awarded to the opposing team when the ball crosses the touchline. Corner kicks are given to the attacking team when the ball crosses the goal line after being touched by a defender. Goal kicks are awarded to the defending team when the attacking team kicks the ball out of bounds over the goal line.

## 11. Substitutions

Teams are allowed to make a limited number of substitutions during a match, typically three. Substituted players must leave the field at the halfway line.

## 12. Injury Time

The referee keeps track of time lost due to injuries, stoppages, and substitutions. This time is added at the end of each half to make up for any delays.
