Badminton Strategy: Outsmarting Your Opponent

Open-Ended Response Answer Key

1. A clear is a high shot that sends the shuttlecock deep into the opponent's court, while a drop shot is a delicate shot that lands close to the net. Clear shots are useful for pushing your opponent to the back of the court, while drop shots are effective for catching them off guard near the net.
