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The Leaning Tower of Pisa

Even though construction stopped and restarted several times over nearly 200 years, the tower was never straight.

Despite its tilt, the Leaning Tower of Pisa is a masterpiece of medieval architecture. Its design is elegant, with graceful arches and rows of columns that make it look like a giant wedding cake. The tower has seven large bells, each with a unique note, though they aren't rung anymore to avoid extra stress on the structure.

Over the years, people from all over the world have marveled at this crooked tower. Engineers worked hard to make sure it wouldn't fall. In the 1990s, they used cables, counterweights, and even removed some soil to stabilize it. Now the lean is safe—about 13.5 feet off center—and visitors can climb its 294 steps to enjoy breathtaking views of Pisa.

The Leaning Tower of Pisa symbolizes human creativity and perseverance. What started as a construction problem turned into a global treasure. It reminds us that even mistakes can become magnificent if we care for them and let them shine.
