What is the Universal Declaration of Human Rights, and When Was It Adopted?

Open-Ended Response Answer Key

1. In a world without the Universal Declaration of Human Rights, people's lives would likely be marked by inequality, discrimination, and the absence of basic rights and freedoms. Countries might interact based on power and dominance rather than principles of fairness and respect. There would be limited protection for vulnerable populations, and conflicts could arise more easily due to the lack of a common framework for justice and peace.
2. (Example) The right to freedom of expression might be challenged when a government censors media and restricts the reporting of dissenting opinions. To resolve or prevent this, international organizations and concerned nations could put pressure on the government to respect freedom of expression, encourage independent journalism, and raise awareness about the importance of a free press.

Human rights violations can occur when governments suppress dissent or fail to provide basic necessities. They can also engage in education and outreach programs to empower people with knowledge of their rights and how to defend them. Additionally, individuals and organizations can participate in humanitarian efforts and contribute to the well-being of vulnerable communities to ensure the fulfillment of basic rights.
